Black History Month: Remembering the Past to Shape the Future-



In February, we observe Black History Month, a time set aside to honor the history, faith, resilience, and contributions of Black Americans. But this commemoration is more than a calendar observance it is a spiritual and communal practice rooted in remembering truthfully and living faithfully.

Black History Month began in 1926 as Negro History Week, created by historian Dr. Carter G. Woodson and the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (now ASALH). Woodson believed that history shapes identity, and that those who are denied their history are denied their full humanity. His goal was not simply celebration, but education. Now in 2026, the ASALH theme is A Century of Black History Commemorations, recognizing this hundredth anniversary. <https://asalh.org/black-history-themes/>

Woodson chose February deliberately, building on traditions already present in Black communities that honored the lives of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. In doing so, he invited the nation not to create a new tradition, but to deepen an existing one. Over the decades, this observance grew. What began as a week expanded into a month, officially recognized in 1976, and embraced by schools, churches, libraries, and communities across the country. Black History Month has become a space for storytelling, learning, and faithful witness. This is especially important in times when parts of our shared history are challenged, minimized, or erased.

As we observe this month, may we not only learn, but also reflect, pray, and act. And may our remembrance shape how we live together, well beyond February.
